NEIL FELLOWS (right) from Germany was one of JB's first new boys 40 years ago, and sang at the Rehallowing of the Nave in 1965.



During the service the Dean dedicated the first new music desk the Song for School - a most handsome piece furniture, of Eventually there will be eight of them @ £500 each.



From **OC TOM HOLDEN** in Gillingham, Kent (with a soft 'G' as opposed to **Dean Frayne's** hard 'G' in Gillingham, Dorset).

My wife and I are enjoying your Newsletters so much and there seems to be more to read with each new issue. Even when my contemporaries are not mentioned the stories and information about music and events are so interesting. What exciting times are being provided by the Cathedral.



Peter Fielding's family history was particularly interesting this time, with so many names of choristers who came with **TLD** from St. John's and who were singing in my years in the choir.

Of course, Peter did not mention the mischief he got up to in those days in the early '40s. I seem to remember certain white mice appearing during Evensong on one occasion. Of course TLD wasn't in charge that night, Mr. Hoskins was! [He was organist of St. Peter's Church and helped out when Mr. Duerden couldn't be there, but he couldn't keep order! Ed]

Peter and his brother **Gordon** I always felt were responsible for the Cathedral starting a Christmas Carol Service. They went out carol singing door to door pre Christmas one year (probably 1942) and finished up knocking on the front door of **Provost Kay**.



They were invited in and Provost Kay's daughter played the piano, the boys sang carols and a jolly evening was had by all. Mr. Duerden was not too pleased to hear of these exploits and at a choir practice soon afterwards he more or less told us so, but also told us that Christmas Carol Service was proposed for future years.

Tom as a chorister

I sent the following letter to the BBC about life in the cathedral choir when the end of the war was celebrated in 2005, 50 years ago.

A YOUNG LAD'S MEMORIES OF THE WAR YEARS, 1939 – 45 by OC TOM HOLDEN

From 1941 to 1945 I was a chorister in the choir of Blackburn Cathedral. Every Sunday I walked from my home in Lower Darwen to the Cathedral in the centre of Blackburn, passing an old mill converted to barracks in the area known as Novas, where soldiers from the West Kent and Buffs regiments were stationed.

On a very sunny Sunday morning in 1943 (the weather was so good -1 think it must have been May or June) many soldiers were lined up in threes outside the barracks in Bolton road.





At the head of the lines of men was a fife band and a large white goat dressed in regimental regalia.

As we processed into the cathedral that morning we were surprised to find the Cathedral full of men in khaki, and in the front row was a very high ranking officer.

During the following weeks activities at the Barracks grew less ind I imagined that the service must have been related to the Embarkation. In those days all troop movements were clouded in secrecy, so no one knew where the soldiers were posted.

The following year, the Good Friday Service was broadcast rom Blackburn Cathedral and recorded for the BBC Forces Overseas Programme.

Again I think it must have been in the summer of 1944 that the Lathedral received a letter from a soldier in the forces overseas aying that they had heard the service and enjoyed it so much as brought back memories of Blackburn. I seem to recall it was rom the Far East, and I always presumed it must have been from one of the Kentish solders.

Some years later when I came to live in Kent I learned that hey had been posted to the Far East, and that they had suffered leavy casualties.

I am a Lancastrian and have lived in Kent since 1952. This tory has been on my mind over many years and untold until now. *I*ay these men be remembered for their sacrifice as we celebrate he 60th anniversary of the end of WW2 next year.

A FURTHER WAR TIME MEMORY

From **OC HAROLD STANCLIFFE**` in Lymington, Hants, who vrote to BCOCA Chairman **Gordon Shaw** after Gordon had showed him round the cathedral.

I apologise for the delay in writing to you but we have had our on over from Canada, doing many things including his participation in the London Triathalon – he came 4th in his group!

A little bit about me: I have Masters degrees from Cambridge King's College) and London Universities; served 20-plus years as in officer in the army; worked in Shell International Petroleum and Shell UK and retired on 31st December, 1984. Since then, nearly '0 years of busily doing nothing.

I married in 1951 and we have two children, a son who is a anadian and Petroleum Geologist, and a daughter who graduated in Geophysics and later Art, but now runs a small IT company with her husband.

Some recollections of the choir: I joined in 1938 under Dr. Brearley, sang at the laying of the foundation stone for the cathedral extension by the Princess Royal [this stone can be seen in the cathedral crypt] and I was in the choir on 3rd September 1939.



Provost Kay brought a battery radio to the service and we heard
Prime Minister
Neville Chamberlain declare war. Provost Kay had put on his medals!

Early in the war a Welsh Battalion had a church parade to the Cathedral; they filled the balcony and the singing was magnificent.

I also know of two choristers of my day who were killed in the war. **HARRY HOLDEN** (Fife and Forfar Yeomanry) killed in Normandy,



and **KEN SHARPLES** lost at sea in the Royal Navy. Ken had a wonderful voice and I will never forget his singing *God be in my head.*

From OC NEIL CAMPBELL in Glos. Hello John,



THE RIGHT REVEREND ACTION MAN by OC BRYAN LAMB

Want to know about an heroic bishop? Try **Walter Hubert 3addeley**, Bishop of Melanesia 1932-47, Suffragan Bishop of Vhitby 1947-54 and **Lord Bishop of Blackburn 1954-60**. He led in amazing life and the stories of his gallantry in two World Wars ead like tales from a "Boys Own" adventure book.

Walter Baddeley was born in March 1894. Education at /arndean School in Brighton preceded entry to Keble College Dxford in 1912, where his studies were interrupted by World War

Walter was then 20 rears old and enlisted in The Royal Sussex Regiment, serving with he 8th Battalion. He vas soon commissioned is a second lieutenant ind went to France in luly 1915.

It is believed that the 8th Sussex never actually "went over the op", but was heavily involved in engineering and pioneer work ind in defensive fighting throughout the war, including presence it the Battle of the Somme in July 1916. Active offensive perations for Walter came later when he switched regiments rom the Royal Sussex to the Royal Surrey in 1918. His services vere first officially recognised in May 1917 when he was awarded i *Mention in Despatches* (the first of four)



Soon after this, in August, he won his first Military Cross. The citation reads: "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. While engaged in digging operations, his company suddenly came under intense hostile barrage. His company commander and many others were killed. He at once took command, showing the utmost coolness and disregard for personal safety, and it

vas due to his example that a most difficult and urgent work was completed."

About this time Walter became a captain and a company commander. Another "Mention" followed in December and a second Military Cross in the New Year, "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an enemy attack. He commanded his company with great skill and determination. He organised and directed his men in a masterly manner, and displayed fine powers of command."

In June 1918, Walter was posted, as a major, to the 8th Battalion Royal Surrey Regiment as second-in-command. From that time until the end of the war, his unit was in the thick of the fighting leading to the final collapse of the Germans and the Armistice in November.

The Regimental history of these days details all the offensive actions of the great advance through northern France and Belgium, and the exploits of Major Baddeley are frequently mentioned as he directed operations and commanded his men in battle.



For the last few months of the war, he was in command of the 8th Battalion as acting lieutenant colonel. In early 1919, his services were again recognised by the award of the Distinguished Service Order.



Walter left the Royal Surreys in early April 1919 and after a short period with the London Regiment, was demobilised from the Army. He was just 25 years old.

In the autumn of that year he returned to Oxford. It must have felt odd, making the transition from a highly decorated lieutenant colonel commanding a line infantry battalion of the British Army, to life as a third-year history undergraduate at Keble College!



He graduated with third class honours in 1920 and straight away entered Cuddesdon College to train for the ministry. Ordained deacon on Trinity Sunday 1921, he was appointed to a curacy at Armley in Leeds. Two years later, he became vicar of South Bank on the outskirts of Middlesbrough where he remained until 1932. From 1929 to 1932 he was Proctor in Convocation for the Archdeaconry of Cleveland.

However his qualities and maturity of judgement were soon recognised and in 1932 he was invited by a conference of the Bishops in New Zealand and Melanesian Mission representatives, to become the next Bishop of Melanesia in the Solomon Islands in the Pacific. In accepting the call, one wonders if he thought of the likelihood of new adventures? Certainly life in the South Seas must have held out a different prospect than that in South Bank.



The diocese of Melanesia (part of the Anglican Province of New Zealand) at that time stretched over 2300 miles from what is now Vanuatu in the south, through the Solomon Islands, New Britain and New Ireland. to the Admiralty Islands in the north. Inhabited mostly by some 350,000 people of Melanesian race, it was quite a patch!



Walter travelled to New Zealand and was consecrated in Auckland Cathedral (where OC INDRA HUGHES was once organist!) on St Andrews Day 1932. He was then 38.

At the time, the CEMS magazine described him as follows: "There are some men who make one want to be a good Christian and the Bishop of Melanesia is certainly one of them. He can lead one right to the sanctuary of God in his heart to heart talks and he can show the wonderful joy which healthy Christianity brings to life. He is full of humour and fun, as every Christian should be." Clearly he was a popular choice.



In his new job he was very much on the move. The Mission maintained а considerable number of churches, schools and medical centres throughout the islands of the diocese and following a custom then nearly 100 years old, he began travelling over 20,000 miles a

year in the Mission's motor ship, the "Southern Cross," ministering personally to the spiritual and material needs of his people.

We have little detail about his activities in the early years, but during these (in 1935) he married Miss Mary Katharine Thomas, daughter of a former Bishop of Adelaide. His main base was in the Solomons on the island of **Nggela** in the middle of the diocese between the islands of Malaita and Guadalcanal, soon to become the scene of one of the bloodiest battles of World War 2.



We are fortunate in having a copy of Bishop Walter's report for 1942, the year in which the life of this missionary Bishop was turned upside down by the invasion of the Solomons by Japanese troops. The report is written in a matter of fact style, but reading between the lines, one can sense the excitement and worries of most of that year.



LETTER FROM LONG-LOST OC HAROLD RANSON

in Northumberland

Harold's photo as a Junior Singing Boy in the 1966 Cathedral Choir appeared in the September Newsletter



Dear JB,

Quite a surprise to hear from you after all this time and many years have passed since my days as a choirboy. My wife was most intrigued by the envelope as I was at work when it arrived and she could not wait to know the contents. She only spotted me in the picture when I said it was in my prespectacle wearing days. The sad part of the photo was the number of good friends who are no longer with us, but I keep forgetting that I am getting older (not little Harold any more!).

I have lived in the Northeast for the last 8 years. **Brenda**, my wife comes from Newcastle. We moved here after I was made redundant from a dead end job in Accrington. After studying for several years I am now a podiatrist *[foot doctor]* working in Northumberland. My wife is a physiotherapist in Durham.

My first attempt at a career as a music teacher was not a success. I really did not enjoy teaching at all and I'm sure you will agree that I was not a very good musician. I did not complete the course for my teaching certificate. After that I had several jobs around Blackburn and Accrington all dead end with no future.

I did have one job working in a GPs deputising service for 16 years, (which is where I got my redundancy). Brenda was not really happy in Lancashire so we moved back up to the Northeast.

I studied firstly for an HND in business studies, which I completed successfully but found that being over 40 was a barrier to getting employment.

I worked for the post office (another dead end job) and then started studying to be a podiatrist at the Durham school of Pediatric Medicine (which was the same place where I studied to be a music teacher, the teacher training department was closed down some years earlier, very strange going back to the same college with a totally different range of faculties). I qualified in June this year and was lucky enough to get a job in Northumberland. That is a whirlwind tour of my life so far.

I never thought you would return to Mellor after going to America. Thinking you would stay over there and not return to England.

I do have a lot of memories of the cathedral choirs. When I was a probationer and for a long time after I was very scared of you. Do you remember when I wandered off on the choirboys' outing to Southport and was lost for quite some time. You sent various prefects to look for me and I think **DEREK CROMPTON** and **DAVID ROBINSON** found me in the pleasure beach. I will always remember your mother's kindness to us (after graduating to the men's choir). when we used to go and pester her in St. Mary's House, where you lived, for tea and coffee (and cigarettes!) on a Friday night before practice. We would sit and watch "The Virginian" on BBC 1 but miss the ending, having to leave so as not to be late for the full practice.

You can always get a message to me through my older brother *Arthur* who is the vicar at St Silas' on Preston New Rd. (and an Honorary Canon).

Anyway I must stop going on. I do hope this finds you well, you certainly look well in the photos. Next time I am visiting my brother in Blackburn I will let you know.



John, like his father, **Edgar**, had been Chapter Clerk, and so his contribution to the life if the cathedral for so many years cannot be measured. He and **Sheila**, used to open their lovely garden in Pleasington to the athedral family for an evening every summer, and many were he delicious sausages on sticks we ate on their beautifully nanicured lawn.

John was often to be seen, in recent years, at the cathedral's unchtime concerts; his enjoyment of these concerts could be

een on his ever-smiling face. The YPC sang most eautifully for his funeral; the vords of his oldest friend, hoir parent Judge Brian Juckworth, moved us all vith reminiscences of such a ull life, and John was carried orth from his cathedral to the riumphant sounds of Widor's Foccata chosen by Sheila. here was a Celebration Reception afterwards and ohn's son, OC MICHAEL. igreed to be photographed or we have no photo of John.



Our love and admiration go to **Sheila**, who so courageously set the tone of Celebration for a life lived so fully in the service to the cathedral which he loved.

To BCOCA Chairman, Cathedral Choirman, Renaissance Singers Librarian, Member of the Cathedral Chapter and Building Committee. and I don't know what else, **GORDON SHAW**, who, this year, celebrates 60 glorious years of singing in choirs! He began as a boy treble in St. Gabriel's, where William Dewhurst was organist –

RED DEWHURST'S father. Then to St. James's (top of the hill n Blackburn) where Harry Hornby was choirmaster. 'He was a hain smoker,' said Gordon. 'He used to smoke through all our ehearsals and also when he drove us to sing at the Blackpool restival – smoking all the way there and all the way back!'

He then moved to St. Jude's Church choir, still as treble, and hen his voice broke. He first met **Sheila** in St. Jude's Youth Club. LD (Tom Duerden - legendary Master of the Choristers of Blackburn Cathedral from 1939-1964) tested his voice at QEGS where TLD taught) and said he should sing tenor. In 1961 he vas married in St. Gabriel's, and he and Sheila sang together in St. Peter's Church, Salesbury. In 1978, after a probationary period when he attended only rehearsals, he was invited to join the Cathedral Choir with **JB**. His sons also joined the cathedral choir – **David** in 1978 and **John** in 1980.

Memorable moments: Hearing St. Gabriel's Cavaillé Coll organ as boy. Forgetting to turn a page for a girl pianist at Blackburn Festival. 'Fortunately she knew the music,' said Gordon, 'but, oh, what a look I got!' He also heard **Gigli**, the most famous tenor of his day, singing in King George's Hall, 'I also remember my first live broadcast with JB – when the men sang Handel's *The Lord is a Man of War*. And I sang the whole of the Messiah for the first time with **GORDON STEWART** when I was 59 years old.



Gordon told your editor that he worked at Mullard's for 40 years starting as an apprentice and rising to Manufacturing Manager. 'And,' he added, 'my present highlights are my 7 granddaughters and my rollercoaster life with **Sheila**. and her many jobs and interests.. Whatta Woman. Whatta .life!'

LAND OF HOPE & GLORY!

Derek Crompton & JB gave two recitals in September to commemorate the Battle of Britain. The first was this season's first lunchtime concert in the Cathedral on September 15^{th} – the actual 64th Anniversary of the Battle (and also, incidentally, JB's 73rd birthday!) They attracted the largest audience we've ever had for such a concert, since they were first begun in 1970!

The second was a repeat (but with many more items) in JB's church at Fence.



The place was packed and the churchwarden had provided **100 Union Jacks** for the audience to wave when they sang Land of Hope and Glory! The singing was so loud that the organ (a mighty instrument!) could hardly be heard!

OUR NEW SENIOR OLD CHORISTER is not to be trifled with!

NIGEL CHEW came to his first cathedral choir practice on March 30^{th} 1969, 4 $1/_2$ years after JB came here. His brother, **PHILIP**, came on 14th September 1970, the day before his 8th birthday.



How do we know that? Because, in the cathedral archives are the two boys' test cards which give the date of their first attendance, and also the dates when they passed the tests which they had to take to qualify them to join the boys' choir. Such tests as singing one verse of a hymn absolutely correctly, with breaths taken at the right places, and mouth working well. They also had to recite the Lord's Prayer and Creed from memory in front of **Canon WILLIAMS**, and show that they could process well, in the cassocks they had earned, and to sit very still in the choirstalls with arms folded for fully 5 minutes while the Head Chorister watched them! And there were many more tests, 'But we enjoyed it and learned a lot about self discipline!' said Nigel. It took about 3 months to complete this training, but when they had passed all their tests they really knew what singing in the cathedral choir was all about!

What's Nigel doing these days?

'I work in Blackburn schools to ensure that their computers are working properly and being used correctly – it's Information Communication Technology – ICT. This keeps me busy for I've worked with computers since my school days. We evolved together!' He started life as a postman, but he always wanted to work with his hands and with electronics, so this is the ideal job for him.

Nigel has a flourishing family: **Kara** is 18 in December, **Megan** is 16 in November and **Dene** was 12 in June. (See photo page 5.) 'My wife, **Laura**, is a teaching assistant in Blackburn schools and is a Behaviour Improvement Person (BIP!).'

Hobbies?

'I lift weights with OC STEWART HOPKINSON on Sunday evenings for three hours! I can lift $12^{1/2}$ stone (80 kilograms) – that's 2 stone heavier than I am! Stew can lift much more than that because he's heavier than I am.'

'Where do you do this?' 'In Stew's garage!' Nigel paused for a moment, and added, 'I also do Jujitsu every Tuesday evening!



'I remember, when I was a boy in the choir, we sang a televised Easter Day service. I had a black eye and next to me was **Roger Margerison** who had his hand bandaged. My family who were watching the service on TV thought it was very funny for it looked as though we had been fighting just prior to the service (both injuries were totally separate). The camera caught us both as we processed into the cathedral.'

'I also remember one day running into the cathedral crypt and closing the vestry door on the chorister who was behind me. He broke his leg and was in plaster and on crutches for weeks!
